Supervisor Tips

CASA Supervisor Tips for Volunteers

Communicate with the Child:

Establish a strong rapport with the child and explain the CASA role clearly.

Discuss the child's feelings and preferences regarding the case.

Ensure the child understands what is happening and the role the CASA plays.

Gather Information:

Review all relevant documents and records, including case files, reports, and court orders.

Interview the child, family members, foster parents, and other professionals involved in the case.

Monitor the child's progress in school, therapy, and other services.

Keep the CASA's Optima database updated with the child's information, especially school details.

Communicate with Others:

Share information with the child's family and caregivers, ensuring they are aware of the child's situation.

Maintain regular communication with the DCFS caseworker and other professionals.

Supervisor Tips

Ask to see the child's educational portfolio to gain a comprehensive understanding of their history and needs.

Advocate for the Child's Best Interests:

Attend court hearings and provide testimony as needed, advocating for the child's needs.

Advocate for appropriate services, including education, therapy, and support.

Ensure that the child's needs are being met and that the case plan is being followed.

Maintain Confidentiality:

Protect the confidentiality of all information related to the case, including the child's private details and the court proceedings.

Embrace Continued Learning

Attend training sessions and workshops to stay up-to-date on child welfare issues and advocacy techniques.

Our Next class begins in September 2025








What's Happening 'Round Town Vernon Parish
